My mixed methods dissertation (monograph), *After Asylums and Orphanages*, investigated the effect of government partisanship on the types of care policies that replaced large psychiatric institutions and orphanages in Western welfare states. It was awarded the Oscar II Stipend for the best dissertation in the social sciences at Lund University in 2022. I coded an original dataset on care policy changes in 12 countries between 1950 and 2015, and worked with digitised public records in English, German, and Swedish.
